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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Shanmuga Industries Arts and Science College (SIASC) is an affiliated College of Thiruvalluvar University. The institution's motto is "Study, Service, Sincerity," and the college seeks to live up to that philosophy on a daily basis. Shanmuga Industries Arts and Science College was founded by the Shanmuga Industries Educational Trust in the year 1997 as per G.O.MS. NO. 666, dated 19.09.1996, Education, Science and Technology (Z1) Department of Tamilnadu. It was started by the eminent legislator and philanthropist late Sri Murugaiyan Ex M.P along with his like minded partners of the Shanmuga Industries Group to provide Quality Higher Education to the people of the backward area, Tiruvannamalai and its surroundings. Initially started with 5 UG programmes – B.Sc., Bio-Chemistry, B.Sc Micro-Biology, B.E.S. at present called as B.Sc., Electronics Science, B.Com and B.Sc Computer Science along with 15 teachers and 150 students. Over the last 25 years, the number of UG, PG, M.Phil., and Ph.D. programmes has progressively increased, and there are now 194 faculty, 5361 students, 17 UG, 9 PG, 8 M.Phil., and 7 Ph.D. programmes. When the institution was formed, it was affiliated to University of Madras and with the establishment of Thiruvalluvar University in 2003- 2004, today it stands affiliated to Thiruvalluvar University, Vellore.

LOCATION

Shanmuga Industries Arts and Science College, Tiruvannamalai is geographically situated in Manalurpet Road, Tiruvannamalai, Tiruvannamalai District, Tamil Nadu (TN). The name Tiruvannamalai is very familiar for the God Annamalaiyar Temple and Full moon Girivalam. It is a big municipality and a main place of Tiruvannamalai District. It is approximately 85 kms from Vellore, 65 kms from Villupuram, 180 kms from Chennai and 220 kms from Bangalore.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

Shanmuga Industries Arts and Science College was awarded 2(f) recognition by the UGC on March 17, 2015, and permanent affiliation was also granted by Thiruvalluvar University on March 24, 2016. On June 7, 2016, the UGC awarded this Higher Education Institution (HEI) a 12(B). The many programmes given by the Higher Education institution assist rural youngsters not only in advancing in life but also in contributing to development of our nation. The HEI follows the norms and regulations of the Tamil Nadu government as well as the guidelines of Thiruvalluvar University, with whom it is affiliated. Due to the dedicated and determined care taken by the Management, this institution consistently performs well in University exams, regularly performing far above the University average in practically all UG, PG, and M.Phil programmes.

The academic infrastructure of the institution is excellent. In comparison to the permitted intake, the student enrolment rate is more than 95%. It is worth noting that Shanmuga Industries Arts and Science College has the most students among the Thiruvalluvar University affiliated institutions. Every year, a greater number of students from many courses get University Ranks. The alumni make significant contributions to the institution's growth and development. Students have easy access to More than 6000 e-journals, 1,64,300 e-books via <https://nlist.inflibnet.ac.in>, and 6,00,000 e-books are available in the National Digital Library. The teaching faculty are predominantly highly qualified, and many of them have been recognized by the parent university. They play an important role in sustaining the institution's motto. Despite the fact that there is a wide spread of privatisation and frequent changes in the policies of both the government of India and Tamilnadu, many self-financing institutions have sprung up all over Tamilnadu as a result, and yet Shanmuga Industries Arts and Science College continues to stand to serve the needs of the time and the youth of the area. The HEI is totally administered by a well-known Trust, Shanmuga Industries Educational Trust, and offers all facilities and infrastructure to meet the institution's needs and demand with so many UG, PG, M.Phil., and Ph.D. programmes. There are around 102 classrooms, 20 labs, and a large digital library. The total campus is situated on 10.74 acres of land, with a building space of 16637.61 square metres.

Institutional Weakness

Shanmuga Industries Arts and Science College, Tiruvannamalai is geographically situated in a rural area and most of the students hail from rural and agricultural backgrounds. When it comes to education, quite a number of students from rural areas face many challenges; they lack motivation, quality and focus. Especially, lack of communication skill in English is identified as one of the barriers posing a great challenge to the students from rural areas.

A large proportion of students at the college are first-generation learners, and although the college has made important measures, the institution can only go so far as the education and vision of the parents for their children are also major concerns. Being an institution in a rural area also presents significant placement issues. Despite receiving university rankings, leading IT/ITES, industries, hospitality sectors, and service organizations do not visit the institution as a consequence, since such organizations seem to recruit students primarily from cosmopolitan and metropolitan cities.

Institutional Opportunity

Students benefit from amenities such as transportation, a canteen (with separate areas for boys and girls), and purified drinking RO water, which is available in all of the buildings. The general library has a strong collection of approximately 15,500 books and 65 periodicals, as well as 413 computers, Infilbnet, and NDL, all of which are beneficial to the students. The institution gives scope for NSS, YRC, RRC, and ROTRACT Clubs to instil the sense of social responsibility. Our students and staff members participate in a variety of events, including blood donation camps, campus cleanliness, eye and dental check-ups, health check-up camps, and blood grouping programmes. The Placement Cell assists students in finding appropriate employment upon completion of their studies. The institution takes great care to preserve and develop its infrastructure. This institution is also at the forefront of encouraging a research mindset. Seminars, symposiums, and conferences are often held to encourage staff and students to get involved in research and to refresh their expertise. Participation, presentation, and publication of research papers inspire professionals and students to do more research. The Management is very keen and pays close attention to initiating Quality, sustaining Quality, and enhancing Quality in higher education through all possible means, as well as disseminating higher education at the lowest possible cost, to help students in Tiruvannamalai and surrounding areas to graduate with flying colours. The number of graduates and postgraduates graduating from the institution is growing year after year. It is a perfect illustration of how the Shanmuga Industries Educational Trust's goal in founding the college is justified.

Institutional Challenge

The delay in the approval of guide-ship and processing of research-related activities by the affiliating University has been a cause of grave concern as it discourages and brings down M.Phil. & Ph.D. enrollments. Due to the adverse influence of the media, mobile communications, internet, alcohol and drugs, there is a steady decline in the value system among today's youth and its vibrations are felt in the campus with ushering problems. Shanmuga Industries Arts and Science College as a co-education institution at all levels has presented yet another challenge of fostering healthy boy-girl relationship among students. Lack of awareness towards the importance of higher education among students and their parents is also of concern here. Students coming from rural areas lack proper communication skills and have a great challenge in placements. Majority of the students need financial assistance to continue their studies as they are from very poor backgrounds. Commercialization of education also threatens the service motto of the institution.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Shanmuga Industries Arts and Science College affiliated to Thiruvalluvar University, Vellore, follows the university's curriculum. The Choice Based Credit System pattern applies to all UG and PG programmes. Faculty adhere to the timetable for lesson plan preparation and take great care to finish the syllabus on time. Having well established infrastructure, the institution is strengthened with conventional chalk and talk approach coupled with ICT tools to teach the curriculum. Furthermore, students are motivated to attend industrial visits/ field study and lecturers in the form seminars, workshops and conferences.

In order to improve the curriculum, the faculty are part of the Board of Studies and the evaluation process. In terms of Syllabus Completion, Continuous Internal Assessment Exams and Evaluation, the college's academic calendar is in line with the direction of the university. It makes sure that there are 90 working days each semester. All students are encouraged to enroll in Add-on courses such as CMA/Tally concurrently with their regular curriculum. Several multi-dimensional and trans disciplinary topics have been introduced into the curriculum of Thiruvalluvar University via required courses, such as; Environmental Science, Soft Skills, Value Education, and Human Rights. An effective feedback system has been developed, and comprehensive input from students, faculty, alumni, and employers is gathered. Feedback is discussed with the respective faculty and department heads ensuring necessary measures to enrich academic excellence.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The college's goal is to provide a conducive environment for students to study and enhance their subject expertise. Many of the faculty members are qualified and experienced educators who assist the institution in meeting the requirements of students both on and off campus. Almost all of the faculty members have used ICT strategies to assist students better comprehend their courses. The mentoring method is followed and supervised in order to improve students in all possible manner.

Faculty attend frequent trainings on new teaching and learning approaches in order to develop excellence in teaching and, as a result, achieve the desired/expected learning outcomes. Many of the staff members have used unique teaching approaches that allow students to learn efficiently.

According to University guidelines, the college maintains a transparent system of internal review and evaluation. According to the University's timetable, the college holds three Internal Assessment Tests for theoretical and practical papers. The internal mark of a paper is determined as per the rules given by the University. For all programmes, the total marks of three CIA exams ($50+50+100=200/10=20$) and three assignments ($10+10+10=30/6=5$) are tallied for a maximum of 25 marks. The end-of-semester test is valued for 75 marks.

Students are permitted to see their valued Continuous Internal Assessment test answer scripts. Students' grades are submitted on a regular basis on the university's exam site. Every department at the institution keeps track of students' internal grades. Other documents, such as Project Reports, Practical Record Notes, University Result Copy, and Result Analysis, are carefully preserved.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The advancement of social and scientific knowledge has enabled the college to establish a Research and Development Cell to foster innovation and harmonize the institution's research activities across various disciplines, as well as research supervisors (M.Phil & Ph.D) in departments such as Tamil, English (M.Phil.), Mathematics, Physics, Microbiology, Computer Science, Commerce, and Chemistry. Faculty members engage in active research and publish articles in peer-reviewed publications. In the last five years, 114 articles have been published in reputable journals, 101 books and chapters have been published in edited volumes, and papers have been presented at national and international conferences and seminars. Extension and outreach programmes are regularly conducted by the college every year: Eye Camps, Blood Donation Camp, Yoga Classes and Breast Feeding Awareness Programmes are some of the few programmes. The institution has a research committee to monitor and address issues pertaining to research. The management has approved the

amount requested by each department to modernize their labs. New equipment's for each laboratory have been purchased to carry out research. MOU's are signed with nationally and internationally renowned industries for pursuing collaborative work. Technical seminars allow faculty to acquire information that is useful for establishing doctoral committees and submitting project proposals to different funding organizations. On-duty leave is available for faculty to attend conferences & present papers. Thiruvalluvar University has recognized 11 faculty members as Ph.D. Research Guides, and 25 students are working on their Ph.D.s under their direction. M.Phil. Scholars are also efficiently assisted by faculty members. Faculty members at the institution are motivated and encouraged to complete their Ph.D. The college subscribes to a number of journals, including Inflibnet, N-LIST (NDLI), NPTEL IIT Chennai (Local Chapter), and e-Journals, and funds are set aside to support research. Guest lectures, workshops, technical seminars, conferences, and training sessions are held on a regular basis to foster innovative ideas and establish a research orientation among students and faculty. Students also gain hands-on experience in their respective fields through industrial visits.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The campus of Shanmuga Industries Arts and Science College is divided into three blocks (Administrative block, MCA block, and New block). Each block consists of three-story buildings with well-furnished educational facilities which promote effective teaching and learning. The pleasant ambiance stimulates intellectual attentiveness and instils in students a strong desire to learn. The college also makes suitable accommodations for students with physical disabilities. There are around 102 classrooms equipped with efficient learning equipment. For student safety and security, the whole campus is monitored by 133 CCTV cameras. Practical knowledge is as significant as theoretical knowledge. On that basis, there are 18 labs equipped with cutting-edge technology. The institution features 8 air-conditioned computer laboratories with 413 computers, including 6 labs for undergrad students and 2 labs for post-graduation students. The college features one seminar hall and one auditorium with full audio visual, teaching assistance, and LCD projectors. There are also 33 computers for office and department usage. For all cultural activities, the institution features a large auditorium. Every year, the college organizes a variety of activities in the auditorium, including Fresher's Day, National Leader's Day, Sports Day, Seminars, Workshops, and Conferences. All Departments host numerous socio-cultural events. The college supplies its students with best sports equipment's along optimum facilities for sports students. There is a large, open field for various sports such as cricket, volley ball, hand ball, basket-ball, and so on. The library is an integral part of the college, with 15500 volumes, 65 journals, and E-learning platforms such as NPTEL, SWAYAM, INFLIBNET, and NDLI. The Library provides the ideal environment for infusing the spirit of education and the vigor of learning. The digital library network is critical for students' learning. All 413 computers in the collection have an Intel i3 dual core CPU.

Student Support and Progression

The college has always been a student-centric institution which is committed in providing the best infrastructural and academic facilities to all its students. Student mentoring and support has been a primary focus of the college and the residential nature of the college has made it a reality. The students are mentored from the time of admission up to the completion of their programme at various levels. Every class has a teacher assigned to counsel and mentor students. The Human Resource Desk in the Administrative Block provides necessary information for students on all aspects of campus life. The academic calendar and handbook facilitates information on the academic schedule and curriculum. All departments have associations under the auspices of which students can interact with eminent academicians. Students can make use of both the Central and departmental libraries for reference work, computer usage and internet services. The scholarship section

provides information on various financial support schemes. The Scholarship Cell caters to the welfare of SC/ST students, including dissemination of information about financial support, and conducting special classes for preparing students for NET, SLET, TNPSC, TALLY and CMA. The college also, has a career guidance cell which helps students to find employment along with other support services which include: Redressal of Student Grievances, Placement, Alumni Associations, and Canteen. Girl students can address their grievances to the concerned women mentors (which also addresses sexual harassment cases). The government reservation policies are followed to give support to the under privileged groups. Medical treatment is also provided in the nearby Government Medical College Hospital which is free for students. Insurance scheme has been introduced for the benefit of students and staff. The Physical Education Department provides the best gym facilities (fitness Centre) which is accessible for students, staff and faculties. Impressive courts and tracks provides avenues for sports and games. Students actively participate in extension activities like NSS, RRC and Youth Red Cross. Forums in the college are helpful to mould the personality of students.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The primary goal of the college is to deliver high-quality education with a focus on social concerns. The governing bodies delegate administrative and academic responsibility to the secretary and principal, respectively. The department head, conveners of different committees and cells, and staff representatives involved in higher decision-making bodies all play important roles in determining and implementing institutional plans. The colleges' strategic aim is to strengthen students' communication abilities via the training and development wing. The college is the best example of decentralized and democratic management leadership. The secretary's primary responsibility is to develop a strategy for attaining the institutions' objectives. The principal administers academic policies and monitors the functions of the academic and administrative personnel to ensure that all tasks are met. In the absence of the principle, the vice-principal assumes the duty. All department heads and faculty members guarantee that all courses are held on time and on schedule. Discipline committee, admission committee, placement cell, research wing, and scholarship committee are some of the committees that help students at the institution. The college has established a Grievance Redressal Cell to address faculty, staff, and student concerns and grievances. The college accepts a large number of qualified applicants for recruitment and selects the best quality personnel. It's worth mentioning that the college offers group insurance to all academics, staff, and students. Every year, the institution implements a common appraisal method for faculty and staff. The institution offers unique evaluations for HODs and committee coordinators. The accountant for the college maintains the internal audit, and the external audit is undertaken by an independent Chartered Accountant designated as a statutory auditor, who first evaluates the reports and remarks. IQAC has adopted best practices.1. The ISMS system; 2. The Feedback System. In recent years, the institution has achieved a high NIRF score and is currently an ISO2015 Certified Institution.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The college adheres to a strong value system with an emphasis on ethics. The discipline and safe environment on the campus have led to the College becoming an institute of choice for youth in the area of Tiruvannamalai. Street plays, rallies, and camps by NSS student volunteers are carried out on a regular basis to raise awareness on women's safety and gender sensitivity. The Institution maintains a healthy environment and takes the necessary initiatives for the growth and development of its students. There are various committees in the institution to maintain the peace and harmony among the students. Every year, Women's Day is celebrated with great enthusiasm. For the safety and security purpose, the institution gives its utmost care on the students

as well as faculty. To maintain safety and security the institution has installed 133 CCTV cameras. Fire extinguishers are placed in every floor of each block. 869 shade trees placed on campus give a pleasant ambience. The Institution has facilities for alternate sources of energy and energy conservation measures such as Solar Energy, LED bulbs & power efficient equipment. Continuous efforts are undertaken to raise and sustain environmental awareness. Anti-plastic campaigns, reduce-reuse tactics for paper, E-waste, and solid waste management activities all contribute to the campus's eco-friendliness. The college also features rainwater collection plants, and as a consequence of the project, students on campus do not have a water shortage during the summer. Solar water heaters with a capacity of 500 liters per hour are offered in hostels. R.O. water is supplied for drinking, while waste water is utilized for gardening and cleaning. There are proper facilities for people with physical disabilities establishing disability friendly resources. Best practices of the college include; Enrichment of students Communication Skills and the Tutor - Mentor System. In terms of distinctiveness, the emphasis is on providing higher education to students from diverse background, therefore keeping to its vision and mission statement while also contributing to the country at large via such activities.

Learners in online education adapt to changes in the learning environment via Google Meet and other platforms in which online education has broken down geographical boundaries by allowing professionals and students from different parts of the world to engage. Learners are encouraged to communicate with professionals, which has opened the path for the adoption of both online and traditional education. As a result, this new education strategy encourages students to use a mixed learning approach. Learners' confidence was strengthened by online education, and they adapted to settings where they could mix both online and off-campus learning environments. During the Covid-19 pandemic, students at our college have access to online lecture notes, prior year question papers, and a question banks via the college web site 'Connect 4m.' The University examination was successfully completed in an electronic platform. Faculty members responded to online education by using tools like Zoom, G-Meet, Google Classroom, and G-Suite. Faculty utilized Whatsapp and other social media platforms to communicate with students and provide information. For all departments, the institution recommends blended learning, particularly flipped classrooms, as well as combining digital learning resources with more conventional classroom face-to-face instruction.

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

Shanmuga Industries Arts and Science College is affiliated to Thiruvalluvar University, Vellore, Tamil Nadu. The curriculum is developed by the Board of Studies of the University that is connected with the affiliated institution. The curriculum at the affiliated university is updated on a regular basis in order to maximize the potential of its students. As a result, the institution rigorously follows the University curriculum. The Choice Based Credit System pattern applies to all UG and PG programs. Languages, core, ancillary, elective, professional English, practicals, projects, non-major electives and skill-based courses are all part of the curriculum for all undergraduates. Environmental studies, value education, soft-skills, and extension initiatives are also given prime focus. The PG program's curriculum includes core, electives, open electives, human rights, practicals, projects, field studies, and massive open online courses.

Planning

Before the start of each semester, the Principal of the institution appoints a time table committee to prepare the master timetable, class timetables, and specific faculty timetables. The class time-table is presented to students in their respective classrooms and the same is further posted on their notice boards. Faculty members at the institution work relentlessly to finish the curriculum in the time allocated while also sticking to the timeline for lesson plan creation.

Delivery

The college has good infrastructure along with well-equipped laboratories. Faculty members present the curriculum efficiently using the conventional chalk and talk technique of teaching. For efficient curriculum implementation, majority of faculty members employ ICT technologies; such LCD projectors, Google meet, Google classroom, and Zoom meet. The college has a practice of conducting group discussions, seminars, and quizzes to help students better comprehend concepts. Industrial trips are also held, which are exceedingly important for students to increase their comprehension ability in respect to their course. The institution administers Continuous Internal Assessment tests as per the affiliated University for each semester in order to assess the progression of student's learning. Facilitating previous year question papers, which is one of the college's novel techniques, is among the most effective ways to increase a student's success in university examinations.

The academic calendar is prepared by a committee chaired by the college's principal. Government vacations, affiliated University calendars, tentative affiliated University examinations schedules, department activities, and college events are all given highest priority by the committee. Each semester, the committee ensures a minimum of 90 working days. The college calendar contains information such as the reopening day, last working day, holiday list, day order with number of working days, Continuous Internal Assessment examinations, question paper submission dates, Continuous Internal Assessment examinations dates, fees due dates, and so on.

Continuous Internal Evaluation

Continuous Internal Assessment methods assures compliance with the affiliated University policies and regulations. Such guidelines govern the allocation of Continuous Internal Assessment marks for each course. The CIA is divided into two parts, each of which includes three tests and three assignments. In line with the college schedule, the college administers centralized CIA exams for each course. Within a week of the CIA tests, the evaluated papers are distributed to students. The CIA marks are determined for all courses based on the students' performance in the said examinations and also based on their assignments.

Continuous Internal Assessment process ensures the adoption of affiliated University regulations. The distributions of Continuous Internal Assessment marks for each course are also followed by the University regulations. The CIA consists of two components like three tests and three assignments. The college conducted the centralized CIA examinations for each courses in accordance with the college calendar. After the CIA examinations, the valued papers are distributed to the students within a week. For all the courses, the CIA marks calculated based on the mark obtained by the students in three tests and three assignments. Prior to the start of the university examinations, students are informed of their CIA results, which are also displayed on the department's notice board. The same data is available in the ISMS software of the college. The results of students' Continuous Internal Assessments, as well as their attendance, are also posted on the affiliated University's website for further reference.

Educating the society is the best way to improve our nation-building process while also enlightening the next generation. Education may be used to raise awareness, strengthen gender equality, and incorporate topics related to human values into the curriculum. Counseling strategies can be used to address the issues listed above. The college has a sufficient number of skilled faculty members to address such concerns posed in various academic and non-academic areas. Women faculty members' of the college work hard to address the concerns of female students, holding departmental review meetings and providing counselling for students with personal issues. Language departments collaborate on activities that enhance students' knowledge, awareness of human values, and comprehension of professional ethics, allowing them to make their own judgments in a variety of situations. The college encourages students to learn about the ideals of being an Indian citizen, as well as honesty, transparency, gender equality, and other pertinent topics that are necessary for them to live a meaningful life.

The importance of our environment and its eco-system has been emphasized for undergraduate students through a two-credit required course 'Environmental studies' in the first semester. The modules of the course are all concerned with the need, application, functions, and management of an eco-friendly and sustainable environment. This enables students to recognize and deal with a wide range of challenges with natural resource conservation and the knowledge necessary to maintain a pollution-free environment.

The importance and use of communication skills/people skills is taught to all undergraduate students in the

second semester through a two-credit course called 'Soft Skills.' This improves their academic skills, such as listening, speaking, reading and writing, all of which are necessary for a successful career. Human values are nurtured by offering a two-credit course on 'value education' in the second semester. This prepares students to reach their maximum potential and understand the true meaning of love and happiness in their daily lives. Appropriate exercises highlight the need of self-control and discipline. Students learn how to comprehend and conduct a successful family life through teachings on family responsibilities and lessons on native culture.

Human values and liberty are taught to postgraduate students as part of a required course on 'Human Rights.' As a result, such classes educate students on the definition and historical progression of human rights. It focuses on the Universal Declaration of Human Rights as well as the international implications of economic, social, and cultural rights. The course also covers international amnesty, regional trends, and international human rights in domestic tribunals. Furthermore, it discusses current human rights concerns like as Women's rights and Dalit rights. Lessons on fundamental rights in the Indian constitution, obligations, the directive principle of state policy, and the National Human Rights Commission help to establish and sensitize students on their rights and duties as a citizen of India.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

Students are admitted in the first year of all degree courses in accordance with the University's and the Government's norms and regulations. During the orientation session following enrollment, students and their parents learn about the institution's history, rules and regulations, traditions to follow, and facilities available at the college such as the library, laboratory, transportation, hostel, placement cell, NSS, and sports.

Strategies adopted for slow learners

- Remedial classes are held to help slow learners, absentees, and students who participate in sports and other activities improve their academic performance. This activity aids disadvantaged students in improving their subject understanding.
- The use of a group study system is also promoted, with the assistance of bright students.
- Academic and personal counseling is given to slow learners by their respective tutor, mentor and HOD.
- Slow learners are given bilingual explanations and discussion outside class hours to help them understand better.
- Simple and conventional lecture notes/course materials are provided.
- Faculty members directly guide students and encourage them to communicate their issues. Slow learners are given extra time to accomplish activities such as reading, problem solving, and experiment analysis. They are also given more attention in order to enhance their academic performance. A good outcome was observed with the targeted group as they showed improvement in their academic performance and university examinations. The main goal of this programme was to make them knowledgeable and self-assured in order to face the tests, as well as to lower the dropout rate.

Strategies for the advanced learners

- Professional coaching classes – CMA Courses and Tally programs are conducted
- Coaching for ILM and FARAS is also available in Skill Development Programs such as Communicative English, Aptitude, and Placement.
- Advanced learners are encouraged to enroll in SWAYAM - MOOC Courses
- Additional learning and reference materials are also provided.
- Assignments and student seminars on current themes are provided to help students to enhance their skills effectively.
- Coaching classes for competitive examinations are available for Advanced Learners.
- Students are encouraged to attend and present papers in Seminars/Conferences/Workshops/Inter-Collegiate Competitions hosted by other colleges and universities.
- Students are encouraged to participate in departmental contests such as debate, group discussion,

problem solving, and quiz programmes.

- Students with special talents are encouraged to engage in extracurricular activities, exhibitions, and cultural competitions.
- The institution celebrates Graduation Day every year in order to motivate and recognize students on their academic achievements. On Graduation Day, students who received excellent grades in the university examination are awarded with medals.

Shanmuga Industries Arts and Science College provides an ideal platform for students to acquire the latest skills, information, attitude, and values in order to mould their conduct in a positive manner. All departments run unique programmes that encourage students' creative abilities while also providing a platform for them to hone their problem-solving skills and assure participatory learning. Students are also encouraged to compete at the intercollegiate, state, and national levels competitions. The college focuses on student-centered approaches of increasing students' lifetime learning skills. Faculty members work hard to make learning more participatory by implementing various student-centric strategies listed below.

Experiential learning:

Each department conducts add-on programs to support students in their experiential learning. The institution imparts the following experiential learning practices to enhance creativity and cognitive levels of the students.

- Laboratory sessions are held based on experiments from the syllabus.
- Summer Internship - Students receive hands-on training while working in the firm.
- Add-on Courses on the innovative trends with NPTEL, Courses, and so on.
- Students create projects based on cutting-edge technology and present their prototypes during

technical fests.

- Industrial visits allow them to engage in experiential learning while visiting various organizations.
- Certification Courses (Value Added Courses) provided by industry specialists such as CMA, TALLY, and others enable them to advance towards their career goals.

Participative learning

In this form of learning, students engage in a variety of activities such as seminars, group discussions, paper presentations, projects, and skill-based add-on courses. Students are encouraged to participate in activities that allow them to put their specific technical or managerial abilities to work.

- Every year, each department hosts conferences, seminars, or workshops for students, in which students from different colleges participate and learn from one another.
- Regular Quizzes - Quizzes are arranged for intra or inter-college student involvement.
- Seminar and Conference - Students learn technical skills by presenting papers at varied seminars. Here, the goal is to expose them to fresh ideas and skills.
- Students participate and use e-Library resources along with online information to keep up to date on their course and curriculum knowledge and abilities.

Problem-solving methodologies

Response:

ICT is one of the foundations of economic growth that may help a country acquire a competitive edge. In an educational environment, ICT is widely employed. It has the potential to improve the quality of human life since it can be utilized as a learning and education platform. ICT is used by faculty, students, administrators, and everyone involved in the field of education. Faculty utilize ICT to make their teaching-learning process more efficient, effective, and engaging. A skilled faculty possesses a variety of abilities

and approaches for effective teaching. Here, the use of ICT in classroom teaching-learning is critical because it allows faculty and students to operate, store and retrieve information. This promotes autonomous and active learning, as well as self-responsibility for learning via methods such as distant learning, which inspires both faculty and students.

ICT prepares instructors to use their abilities in the actual world of the classroom, while simultaneously preparing students for their future occupations and social lives. It replaces conventional teaching methods with new teaching methods and equips instructors to use them. ICT expertise is critical for teachers because it allows them to understand how to integrate technology into classroom instruction. ICT is very crucial in student evaluation.

ICT tools available for teaching and learning:

- Online classes are conducted via digital platforms like Zoom, Google Meet, Microsoft Teams, and Google Classrooms.
- PowerPoint presentations - Faculty are encouraged to make power-point presentations in their classroom instruction by using LCDs and projectors. They also have access to a digital library, internet search engines, and websites to help them prepare efficient presentations.
- Faculty utilize social media platforms such as WhatsApp and Facebook to communicate with students individually and collectively outside of the classroom in order to provide additional information and assistance.
- Online quiz - Using Google Forms, faculty create online quizzes for students.
- Video lectures are recorded and made available to students via Whatsapp and Facebook for long-term learning and future reference.
- LCD Projectors are widely used in classrooms to provide excellent instruction to students.
- Our faculty encourage students to also use the Internet for successful teaching and learning.

E-resources and techniques used for teaching and learning:

- The college library has access to N-LIST, which contains 6000 e-journals and 1,64,300 e-books available at <https://nlist.inflibnet.ac.in/> and 6,00,000 e-books available at the National Digital Library.
- There are electronic resource packages accessible, such as NPTEL and Digital Library. Faculty members effectively use Audio Visual aids to illustrate concepts to students, utilising resources from the National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) to improve the learning experience.
- The server placed in the library provides faculty and students with access to a USB hard disc comprising of online lectures and video courses (offline) from NPTEL.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

<p>2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode</p> <p>Response:</p> <p>Students are briefed through department-wise orientation programmes by the Principal/Vice-Principal/HOD/Tutor about internal assessment, question paper patterns and university examinations. The university norms relating to course-wise examination pattern are communicated to the students through the college prospectus. University circulars in this regard are circulated to the faculty and administrative staff time to time and the same are also displayed on the notice boards for students.</p> <p>Internal assessment examinations are conducted by the college on a regular basis to evaluate student performance in a fair and efficient manner. Students are permitted to view their respective valued answer scripts and the subject faculty clears any issues that may arise out of the evaluation. The findings of the students' performance are kept by the faculty every time the institution conducts an internal assessment exams in order to identify slow and advanced learners. Counseling is also given to encourage students to enhance their performance in the future.</p> <p>Every semester, three Internal Assessment tests are given for (CIA I 50 + CIA II 50 + CIA III 100) marks each. Students must complete assignments on the subjects they are studying which consists of 5 marks. Internal Assessment marks are calculated as 20 marks plus 5 marks (for the assignment), for a total of 25 marks. The Internal Assessments test schedule is announced to students and staff at the start of each</p>
--

semester via the institution's academic calendar, which is based on the university's academic calendar every academic year. The Internal Assessment exam schedule is posted on the bulletin board well in advance of the tests so that students may adequately prepare for their examinations.

For Science students, Internal Assessment for practical subjects is also conducted as per the norms fixed by the University. Unlike the theory papers, the Internal Assessment tests for practical subjects are conducted for 50 marks. For practical subjects, the faculty will evaluate the student's performance on a daily basis for each experiment, including promptness, course of action, result, viva, and record submission, and the marks earned will be noted against each experiment in the student's record/observation note.

Questions are framed in such a way that the students may be aware of the university question pattern for the semester examination. The Internal Assessment tests are conducted strictly in accord with the University pattern in terms of question papers, evaluation process, seating measures, schedule etc.

Special remedial tests are administered with the approval of the respective HOD and Principal for students who are on leave on the days of the internal tests due to medical reasons. This will assist students in aligning themselves with the evaluation stream and the requirements of the college.

The college maintains complete openness in the Internal Assessment. The criteria adhered to are those established by the university. Faculty members inform their students about the many workings of the Continuous Internal Assessment process at the start of each semester. Faculty members enter their students' Internal Assessment results into the ISMS platform, and students can check their results in their respective departments. Internal grades are sent by postal mail, and attendance information is supplied via SMS to parents whereby increasing transparency.

2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal/external examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

Response:

Meaningful outcome plays a pivotal role in making of the teaching learning process. In this context, Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) is critical. This Continuous Internal Assessment is a recurring process mandated by the University's Controller of Examinations, and the results are made available to students. After the CIA marks are recorded in the respective departments' CIA records as well as the college's ISMS software and the faculty in charge of the respective topics, they are audited yearly by members designated by the principal. Each CIA is interlinked with the students' attendance.

There is an examining committee at the college. The convener is a senior professor. In addition to the convener, members of the teaching and non-teaching staff deal with internal tests and end-of-semester exams. If a student is unable to write his/her internal tests due to serious health concerns or any other

legitimate reason, the test is administered for that student in accordance with the institution's and University's standards, provided a requisition is submitted with relevant documentation.

Latecomers are also permitted to write internal tests if the reason they provide exemplifies their sincerity. Malpractice in both internal and external examinations is strictly banned. If a student commits a malpractice and is caught, he or she may face strict penalties or be barred from taking additional exams, depending on the university's policies. The academic calendar is followed by both faculty and students in adherence to the policies of the college and guidelines of the university. Transparency in the examination process has become an inherent aspect of the system as a result of the reform in the examination process, both pre-examination and post-examination. For example, the revaluation procedure is divided into two stages: Part A allows the student to acquire a photocopy of his/her answer scripts, and Part B allows the student to pay for revaluation if the student believes their answer scripts is worth more marks than what was previously awarded. This transparency has improved the quality of appraisal by examiners and did aid in reducing the number of grievances from students to an insignificant level. Registration of candidates for examinations, payment of examination fees by the college through a digital payment system, disbursal of hall tickets with the candidate's photograph and an individualised time table printed on the hall ticket, valuation done using dummy numbers, timely declaration of results, provision of tear proof, encrypted uniform mark statement with photograph, and awarding electronically verifiable degree certificates are all part of the process.

Response:

Program Outcomes (PO) are attained through programmes that provide a variety of required and optional courses. The Course Outcomes (CO) for each course are determined and matched to the Programme Outcomes. In accordance with the course syllabi, the Course Outcomes are quantitatively measured and linked to the Program Outcomes. If the Course Outcomes are met, the Program Outcomes follow the same path. Specific guidelines in accordance with the university are employed during the introduction/revision of a specific course in order to achieve the correlation between Course Outcomes and POs.

COs are essentially statements of knowledge/skills/abilities that students are expected to acquire through their learning process and also carry out with greater comprehension as a result of their learning experiences in each course. A well-formed CO assists the faculty in assessing the CO's attainment at the end of each semester. It also assists faculty in devising appropriate teaching and evaluation strategies to achieve the desired CO.

The Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes of each subject offered by the college are clearly displayed in each department's respective notice board. A soft copy of the Curriculum and Learning Outcomes of Programs and Courses is also available on the Institution website (<https://www.shanmugacollege.edu.in>) for both faculty and students' reference. The curriculum is also distributed to faculty and students so that they may evaluate and compare each subject in accordance with the PO and CO. Response:

During most of their class hours, faculty interact with students directly and allow them to discuss their difficulties and challenges. This also supports for the redesign and evaluation of Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes. The assignments from the internal and class assessments, as well as the student's results, demonstrate that student have gained a grasp of the subjects presented. Three internal assessment marks represent the students' outcomes. Internal marks are assigned to each student through the university web portal entry and also in the ISMS section of each department in the college based on their performance in two internal tests and a model exam. Students can verify their internal mark with their mentor. The average pass percentage of the class at the end-of-semester examination is also an indicator of the class's overall development. As a result, Continuous Internal Assessment could also be used to assess the attainment of Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes. In addition to the mentioned methods above, the attainment of Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes is evaluated in college through student seminars and course assignments. The course feedback also shows a clear picture of the accomplishment of PO and CO.

3.4 Extension Activities

3.4.1 Extension activities are carried out in the neighborhood community, sensitizing students to social issues, for their holistic development, and impact thereof during the last five years.

Response:

Neighborhood Community

The college has engaged in a variety of extension initiatives from 2016 to 2021. There is a healthy interaction with the neighbouring community as a result of extension activities and programmes targeted for societal development and instilling social responsibility in young students. The necessity of keeping a clean environment, basic sanitation, and proper waste management are just some of the few important areas discussed with the community. To raise awareness among female students, women empowerment programmes are held. These programmes address their situation as well as their rights. Gender bias and patriarchal preconceptions are lessened since male students are educated to be mindful to respect women and womanhood. The Women's Cell, in collaboration with the Police Department, adapted the Kavalan SOS App, which serves as a warning system in times of danger for women.

The college has organized carrier guidance programmes for school students. Stationery, rice bags, laptops,

printers, closets, and shortcut formula books for subjects such as Mathematics, Physics, and Chemistry were distributed to nearby schools. The college has also donated free books as well as ceiling fans to the growth of surrounding schools. There are also sustainability projects, such as tree plantation in the neighbourhood. Free health check-ups, eye camp are also organized for the people of the village.

Sensitizing Students to Social Issues

Students' active engagement in social service activities allows them to grasp the actual meaning of living a purposeful life. Through the National Service Scheme, Red Ribbon Club, Youth Red Cross, Rotary Club (Rotract Club), and Citizen Consumer Club, the College has launched several similar initiatives. Students participate in extension and outreach activities that raise awareness on social issues and legal proceedings involving social oneness for issues such as domestic violence, dowry, child abuse, homeless people, female children, victims of violence, the elderly and disabled, refugees, and so on. Students from the college also take part in rallies to promote Clean India, Swatch Bharath, Save the Earth, Tree Plantation, Save the Water, Plastic-Free Environment, COVID19 Awareness, and the Right to Vote.

Adoption of a village

The college has adopted and organized a camp at Keezh-Kachirapattu village to address the felt needs of the people. Here, construction of suitable toilet facilities, distributing hygienic supplies, and planting trees was part of the initiative. For the inhabitants of the village, free health check-ups and an eye camps had also been organized. In addition, the college has donated free books and ceiling fans to the building of a neighbourhood school.

Awareness Programs and Health Camp

Many awareness initiatives have been established by the college, including tobacco prevention and eradication, helmet awareness, AIDS awareness, technology awareness on cashless transactions, the use of fire extinguishers, and the use of electoral voting systems. Health camps such as blood donation, eye examinations, and general health assessments are also conducted. Many students and faculty have volunteered to donate blood during such campaigns, which is significant.

Donations and Relief Funds

During calamities, the college has offered financial aid and food to the underprivileged. People devastated by the Chennai Floods, Kerala Floods, and Gaja Cyclone received relief supplies. During COVID 19, special donations were given to the CM's fundraising campaign.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

Response:

The campus of Shanmuga Industries Arts and Science College is divided into three blocks (Administrative block, MCA block, and New block). Each block consists of three-story buildings with suitable facilities which include clean drinking water, pleasant ambiance, appropriate ventilation, and adequate amenities to cater to more than 6000 students. The well-furnished educational facilities on campus, promote effective teaching and learning and the pleasant ambiance stimulates intellectual attentiveness and instills in students a strong desire to learn.

A well-designed administrative block is a compact block that incorporates the reception area, correspondence office, principal's office, vice principal's office, and accounting office. This block is located in the heart of the campus and has a variety of additional classrooms and learning facilities for students. The administrative block also houses the examination cell. The MCA block is made up of numerous departments and rooms. There are two computer labs with well-equipped technological applications and air conditioning. Near the MCA block, the college has a large and expansive sports complex. The new building houses one seminar hall as well as various departmental spaces for staff and students. The college has 102 classrooms with amenities for better learning and knowledge dissemination.

The college library houses a large collection of subject-specific literature as well as contemporary, up-to-date publications and journals. Every department has its own collection of books, all of which are current editions. For students and faculty, the library offers a distinct reading and book area with about 15500 volumes of books and a sufficient array of journals. The college library server is accessible to both faculty and students. As a result, it is simple to access books digitally at any given time interval. Faculty members make use of such repositories, which serve as "Storehouses of Knowledge," to help students prepare to be future citizens of the country.

At the college, practical experiments and workshops are just as important as theoretical studies; as a result, students have access to the best infrastructure and state-of-the-art laboratories, which are well-equipped with the latest technology that provide an ideal learning environment. For students to improve their theoretical and practical knowledge, the college has 18 laboratories equipped with cutting-edge technology. Chemistry, Physics, and Computer Science Departments each have their own laboratories in the college. The main building has a large, comprehensive, well-equipped laboratory for the departments of physics and chemistry. For scientific experiments, a specialized laboratory is accessible. 413 computers are accessible at the computer lab, which is equipped with 20 air conditioners to provide the best learning environment.

The college provides 18 large, spacious rooms for staff welfare, each with well-equipped facilities such as safe drinking water, a pleasant ambiance, washbasins, and separate restrooms for men and women. ICT equipment's such as intercoms, computers, projectors, and other items are accessible in each department as needed. There are also two seminar halls with good infrastructure within the college. These halls are equipped with audiovisual equipment's, educational aids, and LCD projectors to ensure students' holistic

development. For seminars or conferences, these halls offer a seating capacity of roughly 400 students.

Cultural Activities

The college has ICT enabled auditoriums for all cultural events. The Student's Union celebrates a common fresher's day to explore the innate and hidden talents of newcomers. First-year students are encouraged to showcase their abilities on stage. Every department organizes a variety of socio-cultural events for their students. This motivates student's interest and participatory spirit in cultural events. Cultural programmes are conducted at the college auditorium under the supervision of designated faculty in charge of cultural events. The Cultural Secretary, who is elected by the student representatives, is in charge of informing students about inter and intra-college cultural events. Information on such events are posted on noticeboard, and students are also notified via circulars. The departments in charge of cultural activities ensures that students have ample opportunities to engage in a range of cultural events at both the inter and intra-collegiate level.

Facilities for Sports and Games

At Shanmuga Industries Arts and Science College, importance is equally given for sports and games so that the students in the college experience holistic development. The college has a large campus with areas dedicated to sports and fitness/exercise (physical activities) as well as meditation and yoga (mental activities). Specific places are also available for students to nurture their spiritual faith on campus. There is a large state-of-the-art basketball court, a verdant grass-covered football field, and cutting-edge cricket pitches for cricket enthusiasts.

The Department of Physical Education provides outstanding sports facilities and well-equipped gymnasium for students' overall development. Students here, are trained in sports and games so that they can compete at the Collegiate, Inter-collegiate, Inter-zonal, Inter-university, All India Inter-University, State, and National levels. Faculty members of the physical education department regularly prepare their students for various competitions. Sports players are continually encouraged by providing incentives such as travel allowance, dearness allowance, sports outfits and uniforms, as well as tracksuits to participants and winners. The Department of Physical Education further provides opportunities for students' overall growth, as well as coaching for various college teams in order for them to compete in various tournaments. As part of team preparation, practice matches are often scheduled during training. College teams at the campus are well-nourished to compete in several intercollegiate and state events. The department also has special strategies for raising health and fitness awareness among staff and students.

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1 Library is automated using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS)

Response:

The college library is a vital part of a student's life. The library of SIASC includes a large collection of text books, reference books, and other materials, as well as international, peer-reviewed periodicals and bound volumes of literature relating to many fields of study. These books are made available to students in order to help them improve their knowledge and comprehension of numerous disciplines. Books in Tamil, English, Science, Sociology, and every other department are in separate rows that are updated to their current editions, allowing UG and PG students and research scholars to become more efficient in developing a scientific temper and overall learning.

The library has an Integrated Library Management System, which is an automated package of library services that performs a variety of tasks. Circulation, acquisitions, and cataloguing are examples of these functions. The bibliographic records for each title owned by the library are stored and managed in the catalogue module. Students here can easily access a large reservoir of learning materials from this system. The capacity to search using various indexes, such as author, title, keyword, and subject, is one of the most fundamental functionalities of an OPAC which is also available. Basic and specific searches are also available, with options such as searching by kind of material, year of publication, book location, and so on. For the benefit of students, staff, and other users, the library has a comprehensive selection of books to support the taught curriculum, as well as reference books, periodicals, instructive CDs, and DVDs. The library has several rare and valuable collections of paper manuscripts in its collection. The newly acquired library resources, such as books and journals, are exhibited for the convenience of students and faculty members. The KOHA library management software, which is exclusive to SIASC, can also be utilized to search for any book.

The reading section of the library can accommodate 150 students. There are reading rooms and book sections for faculty and students, which contain reference and resource books on a variety of disciplines. The college houses around 15500 volumes of books and a suitable quantity of journals. It also subscribes to many newspapers and journals for information and knowledge updates. The library has e-books for students as well as a digital library for any students who has access to the internet.

They meticulously maintain the library by keeping the racks free of dust, keeping an attendance record for faculty & students, and monitoring the students' activities within the library. Inside the library, they organize the books pertaining to their respective departments. They also ensure that the reference part and the resource section are kept separate. The library is digitally monitored in both online and offline mode till 4 p.m. Faculty members are always provided with new editions of research books, and if the books are not available, they are ordered within a three-day turnaround. Students and faculty can easily use the library's server, which encourages students and faculty to learn by instilling the spirit of knowledge and the vitality of learning.

Shanmuga Industries Arts and Science College has a total of 413 computers, including Dual Core and Intel Core i3 processors.

Student-Computer ratio

The development of students in the field of computer science is given top priority at the college. Computer courses have a student-to-computer ratio of 1:1, whereas non-computer courses have a student-to-computer ratio of 13:1.

Dedicated Computing Facility

The undergraduate computer lab comprises of 300 systems, while the postgraduate computer lab (MCA and M.Sc.) has 72. The college library offers 17 specialized systems that provide students with a comprehensive platform in the field of computing.

Internet Facility

In today's rapidly changing computer-savvy world, using the internet for knowledge distribution, information sharing, and networking among faculty, students, and administration has become a need. As a result, the College has taken important measures and installed a LAN connection that allows all systems to connect to the internet and intranet. WiFi is available on these systems, with speeds up to 100 Mbps.

WiFi Facility

The administrative building of Shanmuga Industries Arts and Science College has its own WiFi network, to which students can access with the permission of the college administration. A noteworthy feature of the college is that its faculty and research scholars have 24/7 access to the internet.

Servers, Open source software and Proprietary software's

The college maintains two servers for UG and PG courses. Propriety software such as Microsoft Base licenses is used. The college also uses open source software, such as Ubuntu 14, Red Hat Linux, and other operating systems.

Number of computers with internet facility

Students have access to 72 computers in the PG Lab. There are 18 computers, one for each department. The Digital Library, as well as all Post Graduate Students, Research Scholars (M.Phil. & Ph.D.), faculty members, and administrative staff, have access to the Internet.

LCD projectors

The usage of interactive boards for teaching and learning is recognized at Shanmuga Industries Arts and Science College. The fact that eight classrooms are equipped with LCD projectors for efficient and effective learning is a significant aspect of the college.

CCTV Facility

Shanmuga Industries Arts and Science College understands how important safety is to its students, faculty, and other stakeholders. A total of 132 CCTV cameras are installed across the campus, providing video surveillance and security.

About the campus

The foundation of Shanmuga Industries Arts & Science College has built methods and procedures based on 25 years of expertise. With a few frameworks and techniques for keeping up and utilizing each office under its domain, it is critical to maintain the college campus pristine and clean. With great care, a team monitors the everyday activities of the college grounds, including the study halls, research centers, facilities, sidewalks, and transportation vehicles on the college grounds, as well as the play area and gardens. A team of 13 sweepers clean the area every day, and wiping is done often. Seven scavengers, two circuit repairmen, six guards, two nursery maintainers, and 63 personnel, including transportation staff, strive to keep the campus nice, clean, and efficient.

Electricity and backup

Approximately 93 personnel are regularly employed to assist with the improvement of the college grounds. During power outages, the college has an extendable generator asset (60kw and 6kw) to keep the college's electric capacity up and running. The college labs are well-equipped to do research and have safety measures in place such as fire extinguishers and medical assistance kits. Security covers, sanitizers, and

other items are on hand in case of any emergencies.

Maintenance of the library

The Library's resource management includes periodic maintenance of stack rooms, presentation of new content on racks, and the arrangement of periodical issues on shelves. The library, as well as its resources and books, are kept clean on a regular basis. Old and obsolete documents are removed from stacks, and important books, journals, and periodicals are protected from the elements such as sunshine, dust, insects, humidity, and heat.

Physical Facilities of the highest quality

The college is always striving to be the best in all it does. The college has well-organized facilities and places a special emphasis on its computer laboratories, scientific laboratories, buses, and renowned essential facilities. The disciplinary committee is in charge of maintenance. Every year, the college administration has a meeting to discuss the college's overall progress. The disciplinary committee is responsible for a variety of tasks, including ensuring clean water, 24/7 electricity, a clean campus, and complete security. Furniture and equipment are provided by the management according to departmental needs. The seminar halls can comfortably accommodate over 400 people, while the classrooms can seat up to 60 people. The college is a Wi-Fi equipped campus where there is always access to the Information Management System (ISM).

Laboratories

The college offers well-organized, secure storage as well as easy access to laboratories. Each laboratory has enough equipment's for students to work independently or in small groups. Every laboratory has two lab assistants who devote their time to the enrichment of student learning. These lab assistants also deep clean all of the equipment's on a weekly basis. All laboratories are kept in top condition, with all of the equipment being well cared for. There is a public outdoor space where practical activities can be carried out. At the college, all science students have access to updated instruments, appropriately generated measurements, and sealed chemicals that are always available in advance. The college has well-trained faculty who always give it their all for the knowledge development of students.

Sports and games

Students are encouraged to use various sporting facilities for their physical wellness. At the college there are latest sports equipment as well as separate grounds for basketball, badminton, hockey, football, volley ball, and cricket, as well as a gym for health and fitness. These facilities are regularly maintained by a team of dedicated personnel who clean the ground and safeguard the sports equipment for regular students' usage.

Availability of other amenities on campus

There are both biodegradable and non-biodegradable waste management systems available in the college. Pipelines in water treatment facilities are inspected on a scheduled basis. Each floor has its own supply of RO water and washing water. Here, waste water is channeled to a garden. There are enough dustbins on campus to help with the separation of biodegradable and non-biodegradable garbage, resulting in a green campus environment. For the recycling of surplus trash, there is also a vermin compost fertilizer facility.

Academic Dean

The Academic Dean is a seasoned professional who can handle both academic and administrative concerns. He serves as a link between the institution's management and staff.

Principal

The Principal is involved in the implementation of the College's long-term strategies. Through the departments and numerous committees established for the relevant cause, he ensures that academic and administrative duties function effectively.

Vice-principal

Vice-Principals are responsible for ensuring the seamless integration of student-related activities and conflicts resolution concerns, as well as academic advancement, in accordance with the college's strategic

plan and the principal's directions.

IQAC

Internal Quality Assurance Cell actively involves and coordinates all the functionings of the college to an optimum level.

Head(s) of Departments

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff

Employees Provident Fund Scheme (EPF) has benefited more than 60% of faculties and staff. Staff members who are in need are also given a salary advance.

Free medical camp

Free medical checkup camps are organized regularly by the college for all its faculty and staff.

Birthday Gift

Every year, the management honours faculty and staff with monetary compliments as a birthday gift.

Free Transport

During regular working days, the college provides free transportation for faculty and staff. In addition, complimentary transportation is provided for key events such as weddings, excursions, and other ceremonies.

LOP Exemption

The college has given all its faculty and staff exemption from loss of pay due to circumstances such as marriage and medical leave.

Appreciation for Regular Attendance

The college offers a one-day compensation in addition to the monthly income to encourage faculty and staff to come to work every month without taking leave.

Special Rewards

The college ensures that every month, Rupees 2000/- is added to the salaries of faculty who have received a PhD. After receiving the course certificate, the college covers the registration expenses for online courses such as NPTEL and MOOCs.

Miscellaneous Benefits

The College Dormitory Restaurant provides high-quality meals at reasonable pricing to all faculty and office staff. Fee concessions of around 50% is given to children of faculty and staff pursuing an academic degree in the college. 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 Institution conducts internal and external financial audits regularly

Response:

Internal Audit

Internal audits are conducted on a regular basis by the college's own internal audit team. In addition, the

college has a dedicated accountant who undertakes an annual audit to check and validate the college's complete recurring, non-recurring, and capital expenditures. The monthly internal audit report serves as a guideline for scrutiny, monitoring, and adherence to norms for perfect financial control and management. Internal auditing is only undertaken by the college accountant, who does a comprehensive check on each payment and voucher every six months. The college has an inventory auditing (Stock Verification) team that visits each department to physically check the equipment, systems, and other resources stored in those departments, as well as meticulous review of records. Over the years of expertise, the accounting and auditing system evolved. The auditing committee meets on a regular basis to assess and plan for the upcoming academic year's budget. The department in charge obtains clearance from the Principal for all recurring and non-recurring costs before submitting them to the Accounts Section. The Accounts division takes care of the approval and distributes the funds. The account is cleared with official bills, countersigned by the HOD and the Principal, when the programme has been completed. The same is reported on a monthly basis to the Board of Management for review and approval, and it is then delivered to the society's treasurer.

External Audit

An independent Chartered Accountant appointed as a Statutory Auditor of the Institute conducts the external audit. This process begins with a review of the internal audit team's findings and observations, as well as the explanations provided by the colleges' accountant. Taking these findings into account, a complete list of requirements for compliance and reports to the statutory auditor is provided. For completing the auditing of the financial statements of the college, a realistic statement is presented through his audit report. The same ensures that the books of accounts reflected are true and fair in view of the operational activities and the financial position of the college for the relevant financial year.

The college makes financial decisions based on proposals received from departments and recommendations from the Planning and Evaluation Committee for each academic year. The funding will be used to equip libraries, laboratories, and faculty extension initiatives, as well as to provide seminars, workshops, and symposia, and to facilitate student enrichment programmes. Faculty members are encouraged to apply for research funds granted by various funding bodies. IQAC also encourages all teaching staff members to apply for research projects. Audit statements and reports are also used to prepare annual returns. The external audit reports for the last five years are attached.

6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

The college has a well-defined financial policy in place to ensure that funds are used effectively and efficiently for academic, administrative, and infrastructural development, eventually catering to the college's vision and mission. 6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes

Response:

The IQAC was founded on October 03, 2019, and the process of quality improvement and maintenance commenced using methodological approaches for imbibing quality initiatives in the college. By focusing its efforts on fostering holistic academic achievement, the IQAC continues to amplify the quality culture in all realms of the college's operations. On a holistic level, the iSMS system offers frequent status and service level reports to the management. Practice – B:

The IQAC has played a key role in determining the college's long-term strategy. The cell has been designing the college's feedback system and developing questionnaires at various levels for effective growth and development.

Students' Feedback:

Feedback from students is gathered for all courses on quality aspects of the college's teaching learning process. Students, being the ultimate beneficiaries of education, are the best source of information for evaluating academics and the college's various facilities. This helps in identifying weakness of strategies and process flaws. Students provide significant feedback to management on their college's quality concerns, which revolve around the quality of faculty, their dedication to their profession, and the necessity for interactions between the latter and the students. The central body examines the feedback and, if necessary, provides suggestions for improvement to the concerned faculty.

Alumni Feedback:

Feedback from the Alumni provides suggestions about the quality of the college and areas for improvement. It recommends revision of syllabi if needed. Alumni provide support to initiative of new programmes and future job prospects for career opportunities.

Faculty Feedback:

Response:

The institution's main decision-making body is the Board of Management, which consists of the Chairman, Secretary & Correspondent, and Treasurer. The Principal is in charge of all academic and administrative functions of the college.

The IQAC plays a significant role in enhancing the teaching-learning process of the college. This is achieved by setting high criteria for quality teaching and through emphasizing consistent and controlled syllabus coverage. IQAC concentrating the improvement of the increasing of research guides in various departments to promote the research activities. The Principal, in collaboration with the H.O.D's, monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching and learning through structured lesson plans. Extra classes are taken by the respective subject in-charge if there is any deviation from the framework pertaining to the completion of the syllabus. Students who are weak in studies or slow learners in academics are offered extra coaching. Lesson plan are maintained in every class to record the details of day to day classes taken by the faculty which in turn is signed by the H.O.D and the class tutors. Absentees have the option of reviewing the log book for sections that have been covered.

The college IQAC monitors & conducts CIA-tests every month in addition to the revision, terminal and model examinations for curriculum evaluation of the students. Result analysis of the above is submitted by the H.O.D's to the head of the college to monitor the objectives reached. Faculty members are monitored and guided by the H.O.D's and the Principal. Student's feedback is considered to be important and remedial measures are taken to sustain and enhance quality in teaching. The Principal interacts with students on various class matters pertaining to classroom interactions, teaching methods adopted, punctuality and discipline. Every department of the college collaborates with IQAC, and as a result, seminars, workshops, conferences, and webinars are held on a regular basis.

7.1 Institutional Values and Social Responsibilities

7.1.1 Measures initiated by the Institution for the promotion of gender equity during the last five years.

Response:

A) Safety and Security

There are significant safety and security measures in place at Shanmuga Industries Arts & Science College. There are security checks at all entrances and exits, as well as a comprehensive surveillance network (133 -CCTV cameras) that is monitored 24 hours a day, seven days a week in control centers. For discipline and security, all faculty members are assigned on rotational duty. Anti-ragging, anti-smoking, and mobile-free campus policies are all strictly enforced. Ragging in any form is strictly prohibited in the college. Street plays, rallies, and camps by NSS student volunteers are carried out on a regular basis to raise awareness on women's safety and gender sensitivity. There are separate hostel facilities for women with good hygienic and nutritious food. Fire extinguishers are placed in each floor for the purpose of safety. The college campus is equipped with health services which include First Aid Boxes. ID cards are given to students and staff to prevent outsiders from entering the college premises. There are separate cafeterias for men and women, as well as separate entrances to college.

B) Counselling

In the first year of the inauguration celebration, all first-year students must meet with the heads of their respective department and tutors to learn about the colleges' rules and regulations. Counseling services are available to students of both genders at the college.

Students, Faculty, and Staff have their own Grievance Redressal Committees. There is a tutor for every 50 students who will keep track of their academic and personal activities. If necessary, counselling is also provided here. Slow learners who are recognized through this counselling procedure are given extra attention.

C) Common Rooms

For female students, the college has a separate common area with all of the essential amenities. On campus, there is also a specific sick room for girls with a bed and first-aid kit. For common student meetings, there are cafeteria benches and benches beneath various trees. The essential requirements of the whole staff and students are met through common facilities such as the library, canteen, and other key amenities.

D) Day care center for young children

Good parenting is very important for a child's development, but unfortunately, a working-class parent may not be able to provide the appropriate level of care for their child. As a result, amid all of the college's services, a day care centre for its teaching faculty and staff, stands out. The day care facility provides fundamental learning materials as well as recreational activities and a play space for children. It provides a

secure, caring, healthy, and friendly environment for children of faculty and staff.

Response:

1. Solid waste management

Solid wastes are categorized into both biodegradable & non-biodegradable components. Non-biodegradable solid waste generated in the campus include paper, plastic, metal cans etc. Biodegradable wastes include food waste, vegetable peel & leaves etc. "Use and throw" items like plastic cups, plates etc.

used in the college canteen are replaced with reusable items like steel tumblers & plates. Glass, paper & metal wastes is sold for recycling. Food waste & non-biodegradable waste are collected in separate bins. Biodegradable waste are disposed in a vermin-compost unit. Incinerators are used for the disposal of solid waste and sanitary pads. Bottles containing chemicals are sold after usage of chemicals. Empty reagent bottles in good condition are re-used within the laboratory after thorough cleaning and removal of old labels.

2. Liquid waste management

The Chemistry Department use micro scale based apparatus to avoid large quantity of chemical waste. The acidic and basic nature of liquid waste is measured by its PH value & is collected in the labeled drums or containers in laboratories. According to their nature, they are neutralized and diluted with water to avoid toxicity. Acids are neutralized with washing soda or bicarbonates and then dumped into a large pit that is closed. Chemical waste from the chemistry lab is disposed of by diluting it with additional water. In order to avoid circumstances like water shortage, faculty and students are instructed not to waste water unnecessarily. There are also suitable drainage and wastewater disposal systems in place at the college. Pipelines carry liquid waste to a well specially designed for the same function.

3. Biomedical waste management

The Bacteria & fungal culture plates are sterilized in an autoclave (moist sterilization) to decontaminate. The same process is followed by sterilization in hot air ovens and disposed of in landfills.

4. E-waste management

When an electronic product reaches the end of its useful life, it becomes e-waste. The college's e-waste is held in a specific place for an exchange offer of obsolete goods or a low-cost disposal of equipment's. The college looks after the UPS batteries, which are renewed and serviced on a regular basis. To manage e-waste, such as used printers, PCs, CDs, UPS, and so on, the scrap value of the aforementioned is sold and cash is received for the purchase of new goods.

5. Waste recycling system

Waste water is treated in four phases in the college laboratory. Filtration comes first, followed by the gravity separation procedures. The recycled water is next passed through a layer of fine-pored tiny stones and sand. The second stage is the adsorption process, and the third step is the coagulation procedure. Finally, using lime, hydrochloric acid, and acetic acid, the neutralization technique is employed to lessen the acidic or basic state of the waste water.

This is the sole oldest private co-educational college in Tiruvannamalai, Tamil Nadu. Majority of the students that apply for admission to the institution come from the surrounding villages. The admissions procedure is conducted out in accordance with government regulations. Specific allocated seats in each category are filled with great care. The college's statutory committees are well-balanced, having participation from each category. The cooperation of local citizens in significant extension operations is remarkable.

Despite the fact that the college is situated in a rural setting. The college aspires to serve as a catalyst in the community in order to promote peace and national unity. The college holds several programmes on a regular basis to instil ideals of tolerance and peace toward ethnic differences. The towns' council, session court, post office, government hospital, agricultural office, and other government offices actively participate in national development initiatives, national festivals, awareness rallies, and government campaigns. The college campus has flex boards representing environmental awareness, social harmony, togetherness, and values. BEST PRACTICE – 1

Title of the Practice

Enrichment of Students Communication Skills

Action:

Reading the English newspaper is a daily activity provided to students during the last hour of class. The daily practise aims to instil communication skills through reading brief articles, essential news, factual headlines, and motivational quotations on a regular basis.

Objectives of the Practice

The purpose of Newspaper reading is,

- To equip students with good knowledge and understanding skills in English by facilitating them with daily English newspapers
- To encourage students to read newspapers that will help them communicate with others, so

reducing students' fears and apprehensions about communicating in English.

- To encourage students to engage in oratorical competitions so that they can face and converse in English with individuals in their immediate surroundings.
- To improve the confidence level in English among students so that they can achieve their desired goal.
- To improve creativity in English communication using a participative learning method.
- To enable the students to think on high level learning and realize the differences between “pass in exam” and “learning a skill”.

The Context

Reading has been shown to help students develop all-around abilities, improve spelling and grammar, and expand their vocabulary. The goal of most writers is to keep their readers interested. They achieve this by varying their language. This is what makes reading in an English language so difficult, because one might come across a wider range of words that he/she wouldn't have heard from individuals speaking that language. Students are given an hour each day to work on improving their language skills. They are given phonetic instruction in order to learn how to pronounce words correctly.

The Practice

The language of teaching in the classroom is only English whereby the College has created a good habit of encouraging students to learn English. Leading English newspapers are made available to students. Reading brief articles, true events such as political strategies, speeches by national leaders, sports news, and other relevant headlines are regularly read. Reading English newspapers thereby helps students develop proper pronunciation and grammar.

Evidence of Success

Students of the college have actively participated and demonstrated their English learning and communication talents through numerous activities, and they benefited from this since they read the newspaper every day. In doing so, the College has a variety of proof of successful events that have been conducted on a regular basis on various occasions as a result of the promotion of such practices.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required

The biggest drawback of reading English newspapers is that it is tough for students because English is not their first language. English spelling is a question of memory. Many English words have the same or almost identical meanings, making it difficult for them to determine which word to use when. Words in a sentence can be stressed differently to modify the meaning of the statement, which is uncommon in other languages. Conjugating verbs is also a nightmare for students learning English as a second language. To address this issue, students were instructed to listen to English news and movies in order to improve their pronunciation.

BEST PRACTICE – 2

Title of the Practice

Tutor - Mentor System

Action:

The Tutor Ward system, which was implemented more than a decade ago, is another distinctive feature of Shanmuga Industries Arts and Science College. A small number of students are allocated to the faculty (from first year till the students complete their degree course). Tutors keep track of their regular activities, including academic and co-curricular accomplishments, and challenges attributable to their interactions. This also aids the tutors in providing a descriptive certificate at the conclusion of the course.

Objectives of the Practice

The purpose of this practice is to inculcate;

- A first line of communication for each student with the tutor and the college.
- Create a sense of oneness among students with the college.
- Detection and minimization of psychological, sociological, and other challenges that students confront while enrolled in classes, or to direct them to professionals for help.
- Empowerment among students, so that they become self-aware of their own strengths and weaknesses and to take corrective measures

The Context

The Tutor counsels and advises students as they progress through their undergraduate studies. The tutor gathers personal information from their wards in a subtle manner, bearing in mind that certain subjects may be sensitive, while taking extra precautions to verify that any information supplied by the ward is of his/her own free choice. This is done so that the tutor is aware of the circumstances around her/his wards and can provide appropriate help.

The Practice

- When the students enter the college, they get lost in the crowd with too many students in the same class coming from different backgrounds. These students face stress of complex course, peer pressure, and emotional immaturity. Therefore, it is the need of the hour to intervene and introduce mentorship program to this vulnerable group.
- Each faculty member mentors a group of 25 to 35 students assigned to him or her by the Department Head. Those faculty will continue to be Tutors for the same set of students until they graduate.
- The Tutor collects personal information from the ward without touching sensitive issues or forcing any information out of the wards and then provides the needed counseling to the wards.

- Critical issues are brought to the notice of the Head of the Department.
- Each faculty member interacts with their wards informally outside of class hours and advises them on career prospects.
- A documented record of the tutoring process is maintained by the tutor and the Head of the Department for reference purposes.

Evidence of Success

This practice has improved students' attendance and, as a result, their academic performance. The method assisted in identifying certain students who needed counselling, and these students were counselled by the department head and principal. Many of the issues that students have experienced have been brought up in meetings with their tutors, and they have been handled by the concerned faculty members and management (if required).

Problems Encountered and Resources Required

Efforts have to be made to inculcate sense of guardianship in the faculty members for increased effectiveness of the "Tutor - Mentor System". Making the students realize the importance of sharing their problems / issues with their respective Tutors.

education via dedication, concern, and care for the benefit of students and society, by utilizing every single resource-physical, capital, and human-in the most effective and economical manner to produce a perfect model of 'total educational development.'

Area of Distinctiveness: Providing Higher Education to students from diverse background.

We find the following diversity among the students that need to be addressed

1. To educate the students from rural background
2. To improve the knowledge of students who scored average marks in Pre exams
3. To equip economically backward students with cognitive and soft skills
4. To educate the students from other states
5. To inculcate gender sensitization among students
6. To develop integration in culture and religions

The college has carefully prepared and implemented the following action plans in order to address the aforesaid characteristics of diverse backgrounds of students towards total educational development.

Plan 1: Students from Rural Background

In order to eradicate fear and anxiety of college education and improve self-confidence among first generational learners and students, various motivational and inspiration speeches are organised by the college. Renowned entrepreneurs and expert speakers are invited for this purpose.

- Special value added courses have been organized to improve experimental learning through different skill enhancement aspects.(i.e., ILM, FARAS for Spoken English, TALLY for Skill Development and CMA for Management Skill Development)
- Continual encouragement to students to enable them to participate in various co-curricular and extracurricular activities where they can acquire exposure to latest technology linked to their subject.
- Students are actively involved in different intra and inter-departmental activities offered by the college, such as seminars, conferences, workshops, quiz programmes, and so on.
- Students are encouraged to attend a variety of industrial trips in order to learn about the current industry trends. This experience helps to close the gap between the classroom and the real world.
- Students are taught how to plan and organize a variety of events in order to strengthen soft skills including leadership, time management, and teamwork.
- To deliver course content to students, new teaching-learning strategies are used, in which the teacher or facilitator determines the outcome in each class and ensures that the delivered content or outcome reaches all students (task-based learning, e-learning, web-based learning, blogs, and so

on).

Plan 2: To improve the knowledge of students who scored average marks in Pre-exams

- Providing orientation and bridge courses to new UG and PG students helps them become familiar with the college culture while also preparing them for the challenge ahead of them.
- The tutor in charge forms several groups based on their students' learning levels. Students in such groups are classified according to their learning capacities; such slow learners, moderate learners, and advanced learners. Students who require professional assistance are counselled one-on-one. In accordance with this, remedial and coaching classes are also held.
- Students are also offered special guidance along with easier study materials. Students are given a special tutorial classes to help them enhance their collaborative and participatory learning. In such sessions, group discussions, quizzes, role plays, and other creative teaching approaches are planned. The practise also defines and creates a Peer-to-Peer teaching platform, which enables advanced learners to teach slow learners.

Plan 3: To equip economically backward students with cognitive and soft skills

- Providing Scholarship to the students from weaker economic section.
- Scholarship for meritorious students.
- Facilitating Government scholarships for SC/ST and Uzhavar Scheme
- Providing time bound relaxation for paying Tuition fees.
- Students are allowed to “earn money while studying”.

Plan 4: To educate the students from other district and states

- Separate hostel facilities and distinct food facilities are available for students from other district and states.
- Other district and state students are encouraged to celebrate their cultural fest with traditional costumes and practice.

Plan 5: To inculcate gender sensitization among students

- To instil gender sensitivity among its students, the college organises periodic gender sensitization and awareness programmes. A variety of tailor-made programmes and facilities are also available.
- Men and women students have their own common rooms, sick rooms, recreation rooms, and special counseling facility.
- An exclusive internal complaint cell is available for the protection of women students from sexual harassment.
- Exclusive women development cell is established, through which various programmes on mental

health and wellbeing are carried-out.

- There have been health rejuvenation programmes, motivating presentations on entrepreneurship development, and discussions on the benefits of terrace gardening. Various hands-on training programmes in doll and jewellery making, as well as food melas and boutique stalls, are organized.
- Students are encouraged to participate in extracurricular activities such as boxing and silambattam.

Plan 6: To develop integration in culture and religions:-

- Students are encouraged to celebrate various religious festivals on campus. (For example, Samathuva Pongal, Ayutha Pooja, and so on.)
- Students are inspired in a variety of ways to help them appreciate the world of arts, music, and literature.

Shanmuga Industries Arts and Science College thus creates a distinct approach in adhering to its vision and mission statement while also contributing to the nation at large through such activities.
